Word

Reading: Isaiah 55:10-13

For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth, it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it. For you shall go out in joy, and be led back in peace; the mountains and the hills before you shall burst into song, and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands. Instead of the thorn shall come up the cypress; instead of the brier shall come up the myrtle; and it shall be to the LORD for a memorial, for an everlasting sign that shall not be cut off.

Reading: Psalm 65:1-13

Reading; Romans 8:1-11

There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death. For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do: by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, so that the just requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law—indeed it cannot, and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

Gospel: Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23 (response after announcement of Gospel: **Glory to you, O Lord**)

That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the sea. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: "Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. Let anyone with ears listen!" "Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty."

Sermon for the Fifth Sunday after Pentecost, July 5, 2020 by Pastor Dan Belgum Matthew 11:16-19, 25-30

I'd like to begin with a Prayer from the Civil Air Patrol Book of Prayers: Defend, O Lord, this gracious land from misuse of power, distrust of neighbor and stranger, corruption of the marketplace, the illusions of wealth; and give unto those allowed to govern us a due respect for thy sovereign rule over all nations, including our own, that they may be guided always by thy compassion for all peoples, thy vision of peaceable towns and cities everywhere, thy claim upon us to be a servant nation for the sake of all the world. Then by thy strength enable us to enact in our lives a patriotism whose first allegiance is to thy laws and thy ways; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Fourth of July. I was trying to think of a story of my childhood and the 4th of July. Of course, there were picnics, softball with the extended family, and often fireworks. Fireworks came to mind. In MN we couldn't get them, except for sparklers. Yet, somehow a neighborhood kid, Brad, had gotten a hold of some. In fact, he had the remarkable, an incredibly rare couple of Silver Salutes. A powerhouse firecracker. We neighbor kids gathered in his backyard by the garage. There sat one of those old, galvanized metal garbage cans. Brad showed us his "Silver Salutes". He explained that he was going to light two of the Barrel-shaped firecrackers, place them into the garbage can and put the lid back on. And, that we should all step back. Meanwhile, he did as he said he would; and we stood back with rapt attention, amazed that this was happening. He lit the Silver Salute, quickly dropped it into the can, and put the lid lightly on.... KABOOM!!!

Up flew the metal lid -- high into the air --- and it seemed suspended --- between heaven and earth. Then we watched as it came down and careened off the ground with a crash like a cymbal! We were all impressed. The neighbors were not! We were expressing our youthful "independence"!

What defines July 4th for you? Picnics? Parades? Parties? Flags? In this pandemic we've had to pare down our plans. We need to protect our neighbors and practice Christian compassion. On Independence Day we celebrate the independence of the Founders from an oppressive power – the King of England. We celebrate the American Experiment with Democracy, a form of government that is envied by many in the world. Yet, one that continually needs to be reformed and practiced by the people to make it sustainable.

We love our "independence" as individuals. We love to travel in our vehicles when and where we like to. We enjoy and celebrate freedom to assemble as we are now. We value our Founding Father's principle of "Life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." We know that's the understandable desire of every American regardless of their background: their creed, class color or constitution.

At the beginning of today's reading from Matthew's Gospel, we have what one person calls "the equivalent of a 'kids these days' parent rant." (Christian Piatt, Surviving the Bible, p. 244). Jesus describes that John the Baptist came neither eating or drinking (he was an ascetic), and was said to have a demon; and Jesus himself came eating and drinking and they say: "Look a glutton and a drunkard, a friend of tax collectors and sinners."

Because of their practices, teaching, and demeanors, they were judged and rejected by many. Even though the truth was right in front of them, they didn't perceive it. Didn't recognize it. The same could be said of many today. "Yet, wisdom is vindicated by her deeds," Jesus is saying. His actions, his works, his teachings do vindicate his wisdom and point to him as God's anointed.

Later, Jesus declares that only those whom the Father reveals Jesus to will believe and follow him. "At that time Jesus said, 'I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and the intelligent and have revealed them to infants; yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. All things have been handed over to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and anyone to whom the Son chooses to reveal him"

Then, a grand invitation: "Come to me all you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest."

We are invited to come to him; when we feel weighed down by obstacles, by a pandemic, by the changes and chances of life. We are invited to come to him when we are weighed down by sin or temptation. We are invited to learn from him – to embrace his "gospel way" and find life's center and purpose in Him.

It is a call – in the imperative voice – that is: "Come to me." An invitation with an edge of a command! Yet, an invitation, too. It is an invitation to "dependence." Dependence upon God's guidance and will. Dependence upon Jesus' hope-filled assistance in living out God's will for our lives. We are invited to come to him. And to "learn" from him. He will give us rest, and he will teach us what is important in life! The yoke we hear about had two slots for beasts of burden – bullocks or other animals to be fitted about their necks.

The image of the yoke was also used by other Teachers (Rabbis) in New Testament times to refer to obedience to the laws of Moses; obedience to God's teachings. The yoke of the law of Moses involved, eventually, 613 laws and hundreds of interpretations. No doubt about it, this was a "burden" for Jewish believers. Jesus says his "gospel way" is lighter. "Love God and love your neighbor." Jesus offers us help when we are burdened and rest when we are weary. Yet, also, we don't want to miss that he also offers us "instruction" for life! We can learn from him.

As Professor Jennifer Kaaland writes: Jesus' gentle instruction will enable you to find rest for your soul; to find wholeness and completion. Instructors are guides and Jesus' guidance is not harsh or arrogant, and therefore obedience to the word should be easy. Jesus' invitation is instructive. Wisdom enables self-reflection. Truth is the beginning of wisdom. It is a starting point for us to live fruitful lives. Of course, it is true that following Jesus involves a certain burden. We no longer live for ourselves, but with God as our guide. Still, the honest truth is: There is no guarantee we won't experience suffering, pain, or injustice.

Meanwhile, on this Independence Day weekend, let it be known: As we grow in dependence upon him, I have found, and I believe, we will discover He provides what we need! "The Lord is my Shepherd, I have what I need." He brings light to our darkness, and lightens our burden! As we follow, we learn from him to love God and to love our neighbor. While burdens in this life will never "disappear" no matter what anyone tells you, as we trust and follow him. Jesus, indeed, lightens those burdens...

For as he put it: "My yoke is light and my burden easy." Amen.
